3. PUBLIC MEETING RELATED TO ADOPTION OF GROUNDWATER CHARGE

Article 1, Section 75560 of the California Water Code requires that a Water Conservation District that proposes to levy a groundwater charge "...shall annually cause to be made an engineering investigation and report upon groundwater conditions of the District." District staff will present the annual Bunker Hill Engineering Investigation Report and review the Groundwater Replenishment Program annual budget. District staff is recommending to the District's Board of Directors to raise the current amount of the groundwater charge of \$3.14 per acre-foot for groundwater production for agricultural production use to \$3.23, and raise the current amount of \$11.28 per acre-foot for groundwater production for non-agricultural

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DRAFT RESOLUTION NO. 508

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN BERNARDINO VALLEY WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT ESTABLISHING A GROUNDWATER CHARGE ON THE PRODUCTION OF GROUNDWATER WITHIN DISTRICT BOUNDARIES, AND MAKING CERTAIN FINDINGS RELATIVE THERETO

- **WHEREAS**, California Water Code, Division 21, Part 9 provides authority for the San Bernardino Valley Water Conservation District to consider and impose a groundwater charge on groundwater production within the District; and
- **WHEREAS**, the California Legislature has found, in Water Code Section 75521, that such groundwater charges are in furtherance of District activities in the protection and augmentation of water supplies for users, which are necessary for the public health, welfare and safety; and
- **WHEREAS**, Water Code Section 75523 allows for the use of proceeds from a groundwater charge for any District purposes, which may be authorized by law; and
- **WHEREAS**, The District has presented a budget showing the needs and uses of the Groundwater Charge for 2014-2015 water year; and
- WHEREAS, at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors on March 12, 2014, the District accepted an engineering investigation report, prepared by district Staff with the assistance of the agencies in the basin under the direction of Daniel Cozad, General Manager relating to groundwater conditions in the Bunker Hill Basin underlying the District boundaries; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Engineering Investigation and preliminary Groundwater Enterprise Budget and rate options was presented to the Basin Technical Advisory Committee on March 3, 2014; and
- WHEREAS, the District provided mailed notice to all groundwater producers within its District boundaries of a public meeting held on April 9, 2014, and a public hearing held on April 23, 2014, inviting all groundwater producers and all persons interested in the condition of groundwater or surface water supplies of the District to appear and submit evidence, and inviting all water producers to examine the engineering investigation report; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Board of Directors has conducted a public meeting on April 9, 2014, and a public hearing on April 23, 2014, and has received comment and evidence submitted by the public at such hearing; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Board has considered the engineering investigation report, and considered all comments and evidence presented to it at the public meetings and hearing; and
- **WHEREAS**, the District has made available by wide distribution a Groundwater Enterprise Budget identifying the estimated use of the Groundwater Charge proceeds which will be subsequently incorporated in the District budget; and
- **WHEREAS**, the District's ad valorem tax revenues are limited and the District has experienced a decrease in revenues from interest on reserves, which is expected to remain at a low rate; and
- **WHEREAS**, on the basis of all evidence presented, including the engineering investigation and report and such public comment, the Board has determined that it is appropriate and in the best interests of the District and all those water users who rely, directly or indirectly, on the District's services, to levy a groundwater charge as further provided herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN BERNARDINO VALLEY WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

- <u>Section 1</u>. As required by Water Code Section 75574, the Board hereby makes the following findings:
 - A. Annual Change in Storage in those portions of the Bunker Hill Basin lying within the District's boundaries ("Bunker Hill Basin" herein), Fall 2012 to Fall 2013, is an decrease of -129,945 acre-feet.
 - B. Accumulated Change in Storage in the Bunker Hill Basin as of the Last Day of the Preceding Water Year (using 1993 as base year) is -444,322 acre-feet.
 - C. Total Groundwater Production from the Bunker Hill Basin from the Preceding Water Year July 1, 2012 to June 30, 2013 is 182,393 acre-feet.

- D. Estimate of the Annual Change in Storage for the Current Water Year (July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014) in the Bunker Hill Basin is -65,285 acre-feet.
- E. Estimate of the Annual Change in Storage for the Ensuing Water Year (July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015) in the Bunker Hill Basin is 2,253 acre-feet.
- F. Average Annual Change in Storage for the Immediate Past Ten Water Years in the Bunker Hill Basin is -8,065 acre-feet.
- G. Estimated Amount of Agricultural Water Withdrawn from the Groundwater Supplies of the District for the Ensuing Water Year (July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015) is 18,864 acre-feet.
- H. Estimated Amount of Other-than-Agricultural Water Withdrawn from the Groundwater Supplies of the District for the Ensuing Water Year (July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015) is 87,309 acre-feet.
- I. Estimated Amount of Water Necessary for Surface Distribution for the Ensuing Water Year (July 1, 2014
 June 30, 2015) within the Bunker Hill Basin is 71,861 acre-feet.
- J. Estimated Amount of Water Necessary for Surface Distribution for the Ensuing Water Year (July 1, 2014 June 30, 2015) for the District is 58,856 acre-feet.
- K. The Amount of Water which is Necessary for the Replenishment of the Groundwater Supplies of the Bunker Hill Basin to maintain constant groundwater supplies for the Ensuing Water Year (July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015) is 141,087 acre-feet.
- L. The Amount of Water which is Necessary from all sources, including natural recharge to bring the basin back to its "full" condition of 1993 is 444,322 acre-feet.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors hereby finds that the entire District constitutes a single zone of benefit for the imposition of this charge. The basis for this finding is that the entire portion of the basin underlying the District boundary is fed by the same naturally occurring surface flows. Although the basin may be divided into various subparts, because of hydrogeologic conditions these areas are interconnected, and water recharged by the District from its existing recharge facilities contributes to underground "flows" which eventually reach other subparts of the basin. Thus, the District's recharge inures to the benefit of users in other areas by enhancing the availability of water supplies throughout the basin. In addition, the District maintains both the availability of surface water flows for groundwater recharge, and the facilities for accommodating the recharge, whether by the District or by other parties pursuant to collaborative regional groundwater management efforts. For the past and ensuing water years, agricultural production represents 20% of the District total production and non-agricultural production 80%.
- Section 3. The Board finds that there is no past accumulation of the amount of water necessary to be replaced in the intake areas of the groundwater basins within the District to prevent the landward movement of salt water into the fresh groundwater body, or to prevent subsidence of the land within the District, either in the past water year or the proceeding 10 years, nor is there likely to be any amount of water necessary for these purposes in the ensuing water year. The Board further finds that the District is not obligated by contract to purchase any water. The Board also finds that further recharge of the basin is required based upon the findings related to change in storage stated in Section 1 above, to prevent depletion or degradation to the basin's groundwater supplies, to enhance both the availability and accessibility of such supplies, and to replenish, augment, and protect such supplies, and that the proceeds of the groundwater charge established hereon shall be used for such purposes.
- The Board of Directors hereby levies, assesses and affixes a groundwater charge in the amount of \$3.23 per acre-foot for agricultural water (§75508), and in the amount of \$11.62 per acre-foot for non-agricultural water the latter being 3.59 times the agricultural rate. Late charges on delinquent accounts will be 1% interest per month in accordance with Water Code §75615 et set. and any additional actual costs to collect delinquent amounts not paid by February 1, 2015 and August 1, 2015. Deposit or prepayment of production costs may be made by written agreement with the District. Direct production of water for agricultural use on Golf Courses by the owners of the course will be set at a rate equal to the Agricultural rate, in accordance with California Water Code §75592 and § 75594. Exemptions: Notwithstanding the foregoing, for producers who can demonstrate either (1) that their production for the water year is restricted to basic, personal residential use limited to the property on which the applicable groundwater production facility is based; or (2) that their production for the water year is restricted to agricultural use limited to the property on which the applicable groundwater production facility is based, and total cumulative production for the applicable producer within the District is not in excess of two (2) acre feet over the course of the water year; such production shall be exempted from the groundwater charge provided the producer documents its exemption prior to bi-annual collection of the groundwater charge . In establishing this exemption, the Board finds that the likely revenues to be derived from the groundwater production subject to the exemption is outweighed by the administrative burdens in

administering and collecting the charge. The District General manager is authorized to waive late fees with explanation and request from payees or if the cost of recovery outweighs the fee to be collected.

<u>Section 5</u>. In connection with fixing the groundwater chart as set forth in Section 4 above, the Board of Directors makes the following findings:

- A. The groundwater charge is imposed upon the action of extraction of groundwater from the basin underlying the District's boundaries, and not on property or groundwater extraction facilities as such. The groundwater charge will be incurred by groundwater producers through their voluntary action of groundwater production. The groundwater charge is not one for water delivery by the District to groundwater extractors, but rather relates to the District's service of maintaining groundwater supplies, recharge facilities, and management of both for groundwater extractors within the District. The District maintains no pipes, canals or other facilities directly connecting District facilities to the groundwater extractors' property or pumping facilities. In addition, parties subject to the groundwater charge are not property owners, per se, but predominantly either public or private entities involved in the business of providing water, or persons or entities involved in irrigation, for agricultural-related activities, and for uses of water exceeding what would be required for basic residential use of the property.
- B. The District has provided notice of the proposal for imposition of the groundwater charge through a number of different avenues. Mailed notice was provided to all operators reflected on the District's records as containing active groundwater production facilities within the District. In addition, published notice was provided in the San Bernardino Sun on February 25, March 4, March, and March 11, 2014 and in the Highland Community News on February 28, March 7 and March 14, 2014. All such notices identified the prior and proposed existing rate for agricultural and non-agricultural water, the estimated total revenue to be collected from the charge, and the time and place for public hearing at a public meeting at which parties objecting to the charge could appear and be heard.
- C. The proposed groundwater charges, and engineering investigation prepared by the District, were reviewed at a public meeting held April 9, 2014, and a public hearing held April 23, 2014 and a special meeting on April 29, 2013. In addition, the engineering investigation prepared by the District was presented to and reviewed with the Board of Directors at a public meeting on March 12, 2014, and was presented to the Basin Technical Advisory Commission on March 3, 2014.
- D. The groundwater charge is being levied to assist in offsetting the costs of the District's Groundwater Enterprise in providing groundwater supplies, groundwater recharge facilities, and recharge management and administration for the benefit of groundwater producers within the District. The Groundwater Enterprise Budget includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - 1. Making available the District's Santa Ana River water rights, in an amount no less than 10,400 acres per feet per year, for recharge into the Bunker Hill Basin;
 - 2. Conducting groundwater recharge activities by diverting both Santa Ana River and Mill Creek water supplies into District's recharge facilities;
 - 3. Applying the District's experience and expertise in directing groundwater recharge effectively and efficiently, administering the physical recharge of groundwater both directly for the District and its water supplies, and recharging on behalf of other entities, including exchanges under the Santa Ana River/Mill Creek Cooperative Water Project Agreement;
 - 4. Maintaining and operating the District's diversion works, recharge basins and canals to insure the availability of sufficient infrastructure to accommodate needed groundwater recharge; and defense and protection of the District's water rights and manner of operations;
 - 5. Investigation and implementation of improvements to groundwater recharge infrastructure;
 - 6. Reporting to groundwater producers and other interested parties of groundwater recharge activities and conditions, including but not limited to the daily flow report;
 - 7. Conducting engineering analyses, such as the District's annual engineering investigation, designed to provide information regarding the District's groundwater basin and groundwater recharge facilities; and
 - 9. Administrative support, training and overhead for all the above-listed activities.
- E. The total amount of estimated revenues from the groundwater charge is estimated at approximately \$873,295 based on production reported for the 2013-2014 water year. These revenues do not fully

recover expected cost and will not exceed the costs of providing the services as detailed above, in that the District's Groundwater Enterprise Budget for fiscal year 2014-2015 proposes \$1,065,448.

- F. The amount of groundwater charge paid by each individual payor will not exceed the benefit of the Conservation District's services to such parties, because the structure of the groundwater charge is such that the amount paid varies in direct proportion to the amount of groundwater supplies extracted, and therefore is proportional to the benefit each individual payor receives from the District's services.
- G. The District's services are immediately available to all parties subject to the charge, because the charge is limited to those extracting groundwater, and therefore able to take advantage of the District's services relative to groundwater recharge activities, facilities, and programs.
- H. The District's services are directed toward groundwater production and extractors, and are not generally available to parties not involved with groundwater extraction, as are other general governmental services such as police, fire, library, or other broad governmental services. The District's service is directed toward, and of benefit to, parties utilizing and extracting groundwater in the District.
- <u>Section 6.</u> District staff is directed to prepare a report at the end of the water year for which the charge levied herein is imposed, detailing the revenues collected from the groundwater charge, and describing the purposes and expenses to which such revenues were applied toward the services detailed in Section 5(D) above.
- Section 7. The Board of Directors further finds that the groundwater charge adopted herein is statutorily exempt from CEQA under Title 14, California Code of Regulations Sections 15273, 15301, and 15306. The action contemplated herein constitutes a structuring and establishment of a charge which will be used in part for meeting operating expenses and for purchasing or leasing equipment and materials. To the extent the groundwater charge revenues will be applied to groundwater testing, these activities fit within Title 14, California Code of Regulations Section 15306. Such activities involve the occasional taking of groundwater samples by means of temporary equipment, which will not cause any alteration to the land, and consist solely of information gathering. To the extent any portion of the funds is directed to maintenance, operation, or repair of existing facilities, involving no or negligible expansion of existing uses, these activities fit within Title 14, California Code of Regulations Section 15301. To the extent any portion of the funds is directed to construction or establishment of new facilities, environmental review of such facilities will occur at such time those facilities are proposed, and the nature, location, scope, and function of such potential future facilities becomes known. Under each of the above-referenced exemptions, therefore, the Board of Directors finds that the levy and implementation of the groundwater charge is therefore properly exempt from CEQA.

<u>Section 8.</u> The General Manager is hereby authorized and directed to provide notice to operators of the levy of the groundwater charge, as provided for in Water Code Section 75610.

B. 2014 FINAL ENGINEERING INVESTIGATION REPORT

Mr. Cozad presented this item for discussion. He noted that additional data was received by agencies which did not affect the figures, tables or appendices. The Final Engineering Investigation (EI) report has been published to the District website at the link shown in the agenda. Mr. Cozad indicated that Staff identified a reporting error related to Gage Wells. Production from the Gage Wells was being double counted due to duplicate reporting from the City of Riverside and Gage Canal Company; however different methods were used so the error was not immediately apparent. Upon checking with both entities this error has been fixed in the Final EI. President Corneille asked if the BTAC had any changes. Mr. Cozad presented the Final EI to them on March 3rd and they did not have any revisions to the report.

C. AUDITOR PROCUREMENT AND SELECTION FOR 2014

Mr. Cozad introduced this item for discussion. He stated that the Ad Hoc Audit Committee of President Corneille and Director Raley met on January 8th. An RFP was sent out on January 10th to 14 auditing firms in which 7 proposals were received. Staff placed the proposals into a spreadsheet for Ad Hoc Audit Committee review. Based on a detailed evaluation of the proposals received, the Ad Hoc Audit Committee recommends Eadie & Payne for the upcoming audit. Mr. Cozad verified references and positive feedback was provided. The selected auditing firm fee is slightly higher than the previous auditors.

It was moved by Vice President McDonald and seconded by Director Raley to move the Ad Hoc Audit Committee's recommendation to authorize President Corneille to enter into an agreement with selected audit firm Eadie & Payne for an amount not to exceed \$20,000 to prepare the audit for Fiscal Year 2013-2014. The motion carried.

D. NEW REDLANDS PLAZA SIGN

Vice President McDonald commended Staff on the design presented in the package. President Corneille requested that the District be listed on the new monument sign in the first panel. Mr. Cozad indicated that the District will need a permit prior to the new sign being installed. He indicated it's not a conforming sign, but Quiel is optimistic the City of Redlands will approve. Mr. Cozad stated that Quiel Signs has stated that permitting should not be an issue. He indicated that the agreement with Quiel Signs has been reviewed and approved by general counsel. Brief discussion ensued regarding permitting. President Corneille asked what would happen if the City of Redlands did not grant a permit. Mr. Cozad indicated that it would be sent to Quiel Signs for redesign. Director Raley asked if there is cost for redesign. Mr. Cozad said that if the sign had to be redesigned there may be minor cost, but that if the sign was smaller, cost would be less. Vice President McDonald stated that she is in support of replacing sign and that it will be Quiel Signs responsibility to obtain permitting. Brief discussion ensued.

It was moved by Vice President McDonald and seconded by Director Raley to move Staff's recommendation to enter into an agreement with Quiel Signs to purchase a new monument sign for Redlands Plaza in the amount not to exceed, \$14,271.61 plus city's permitting fees. The motion carried.

President Corneille polled the Board for interested parties. Discussion ensued as to what region was covered. President Corneille indicated that Director Raley would need to complete additional training within two years, if elected.

It was moved by Director Longville and seconded by Vice President McDonald to nominate Director Raley for CSDA Board of Directors, Region 6, Seat C. The motion carried.

She said that Director Aranda has been on the Board and asked if he would be interested in being nominated for this Board. He indicated his interest to sit on the Board. Discussion ensued regarding the requirements to be nominated.

It was moved by Director Longville and seconded by Vice President McDonald to nominate Director Aranda for the ACWA Region 9 Board and prepare a resolution in accordance with the ACWA template subject to general counsel approval to be signed by President Corneille and Mr. Cozad. The motion carried.

G. MILL CREEK STORM UPDATE AND POSSIBLE ACTION

Mr. Cozad reviewed a PowerPoint of the damage that occurred to field operations in Mill Creek. He indicated that there was a breach in the levee in Mill Creek and the soft plug did not wash out fully and that the levee next to the diversion overflowed with water. Mr. Cozad said that normally the flow would have gone into Basin 2, but since EBXII project is taking place it flowed into their excavation. He indicated the flow from the storm reached between 100-300 CFS. Staff paid Jacinto Construction approximately \$4,500 for emergency repairs. Mr. Cozad stated that the District has received information related to an expected request for repairs and an invoice for repairs to EBXII from Spiniello Construction estimated at \$9,000. A claim has not been submitted but is expected. He continued detailed review of the flows that caused that damage. Discussion ensued. The Operations Committee will tour the site at their meeting on March 17th. The update was accepted and no action was required.

6. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

Mr. Cozad indicated that this item was covered previously and written report is in package. It included before and after pictures of storm and several other items.

B. MONTHLY RECHARGE REPORT

Mr. Cozad noted that the District is taking Bear Valley Mutual's water in Mill Creek and recharging it on behalf of the City of Redlands. He also indicated that there are a number of leaks in the dikes that were re-built due to the EBXII pipeline construction. Mr. Cozad presented pictures of the basins which were filled and that show leaks in several walls of the basins. The contractors for EBXII are working on repairing these leaks, but the lack of recharge water will

limit the re-testing of the basins after repairs this year. Field staff is attempting to identify if the District is getting underground flow along the EBXII pipeline in the backfill. He stated that the installation of the pipe is not supposed to impede District operations. Vice President McDonald asked if it was percolating. Mr. Cozad believes that these basins are recharging. He stated that it is hard to assess at this point if the water is percolating or moving from basin to basin due to the leaks. Discussion ensued. SBVMWD may review this issue as well. The Operations Committee will review this item at their Monday meeting.

C. WASH PLAN REPORT

Mr. Beehler reviewed this item. On pages 78-80 in the package there are maps of the impacts of covered activities on endangered species. He reviewed the maps and noted that most of the covered activities impacts on the habitat for the San Bernardino Kangaroo Rat (SBKR) arelow, and for the Woolly star and Spine flower are high. Mr. Beehler stated a geodatabase has been completed with intern help. This is where all GIS data is placed into a single database and linked to how much maintenance occurs, when it occurs and a description of what maintenance is required. Mr. Beehler explained phasing. Vice President McDonald asked if mitigation on District roads is continual. Mr. Beehler indicated it is reoccurring and that he is taking all of the operation and maintenance mitigation activities and putting them into the database so that they are covered, but because of the way we do O&M the mitigation is not significant. He also indicated that maintenance activities are included to ensure that entities do not have to mitigate for coverage they do not need. President Corneille stated that the District had some preliminary consultations with FWS and indicated that some of this information presented today is based on these discussions. Mr. Beehler stated that the high low habitat quality concept is based on discussions with FWS. He indicated that where the District is performing activities in SBKR habitat, which is low quality, it should be reflected in mitigation. Mr. Cozad reminded the Board that the reason FWS would not previously move forward with the permitting of the Wash Plan is because covered activities were not specifically identified. He indicated that Mr. Beehler has been tasked with identifying the specifics on covered activities and their impacts on endangered species. Mr. Cozad stated that the District should have a baseline of these items. Vice President McDonald and President Corneille commended staff on the information presented today. Mr. Beehler indicated that the interns helped immensely and that they are trying to be sure that all covered activities are included.

D. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS & STAFF TASK REQUEST FROM DIRECTORS

President Corneille appointed an Ad Hoc Committee for General Manager Evaluation with Vice President McDonald and himself as the members. Vice President McDonald indicated that findings will come back to the Board after the Ad Hoc Committee.

President Corneille requested that Director Aranda speak on the Water Bond issue, which he has been closely following. Director Aranda indicated there are several versions of the bond that the Board could discuss. He noted the bond proposals range from ACWA's originally supported proposal of \$11.14 billion approved for the November ballot, to AWCA's currently suggested proposal of \$8.2 billion, and two legislative bond proposals (SB 848 by Wolk, and AB 1331 by Rendon) for \$6.5 billion. Negotiations are underway to come to try to come to an

agreement on a bond proposal for the November ballot that can address the statewide priorities and pass.

He indicated that even if the bond passes there is still the issue of teaching the public about water conservation. Director Aranda reviewed conservation issues and possible incentives. He stated the importance of conserving water and conveying that message to the public.

7. MONTHLY BOARD MEMBER COMMITTEE ACTIVITY REPORTS, AND/OR COMMENTS BY BOARD MEMBERS

Director Raley attended the State of the County Program along with the full Board. He also attended the Ad Hoc Audit Committee, Rise N Shine Redlands, and CSDA Fiscal Committee. He attended the Big Bear Watermaster Committee where it was noted that the lake is down 7.7 feet below full and they are not majorly impacted by the drought but are affected.

Director Longville attended the State of the County.

Vice President McDonald attended the SBVMWD Board meeting where they adopted the Water Conservation Plan and approved a contract with CV Strategies for outreach activities related to the drought in the amount of \$29,000. She also attended BTAC where reports were given from all of the subcommittees and Mr. Cozad reported on the 2014 Engineering Investigation Report. She attended USAWRA, ACWA State Legislative Committee meeting, Highland Chamber, State of the County, and ACWA/JPIA HR Training, She attended the ACWA Water Management Committee meeting where they discussed final framework report, drought and subcommittee listing.

Director Aranda attended the Three Valley's Municipal Water District on "California's Path to a More Reliable Water Supply" presented by Mark Cowin, Director of DWR. He also attended Rise N Shine Redlands, BTAC, and SBACC. He indicated that he will be making a presentation at SBACC in two weeks on the drought and water conservation.

President Corneille attended the Ad Hoc Audit Committee, HACC Quarterly Breakfast and the State of the County. He indicated that the Board Member Meeting Reports are duplicative and requested that a "prepared by" line be added. This item is to be reviewed by Finance & Administration Committee.

Director Aranda included in the package his request to attend the ACWA Spring Conference with total estimated cost to attend in the amount of \$2,861.

It was moved by Vice President McDonald and seconded by Director Longville to approve Director Aranda's attendance and cost estimate. The motion carried.

RECOMMENDATION

Review, discuss and approve the unaudited financials for March 2014 and receive and file the Annual Compensation and Expense Reimbursement Disclosure.

BACKGROUND

Staff provides the Unaudited Financial Reports for Board review and approval each month.

Staff identified the requirement to provide an annual disclosure of reimbursements at least \$100 for each year and make them available to the public upon request. California Government Code §53065.5 is paraphrased below:

"Each special district, as defined by subdivision (a) of Section 56036, shall, at least annually, disclose any reimbursement paid by the district within the immediately preceding fiscal year of at least one hundred dollars (\$100) for each individual charge for services or product received. "Individual charge" includes, but is not limited to, one meal, lodging for one day, transportation, or a registration fee paid to any employee or member of the governing body of the district. The disclosure requirement shall be fulfilled by including the reimbursement information in a document published or printed at least annually by a date determined by that district and shall be made available for public inspection.

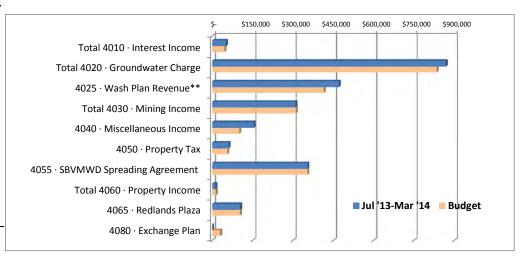

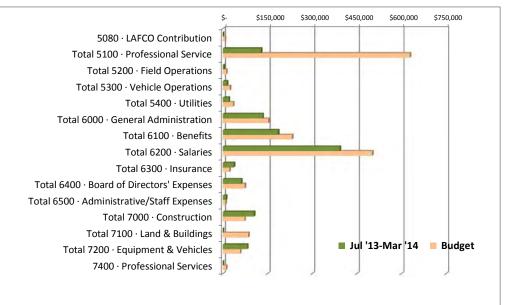

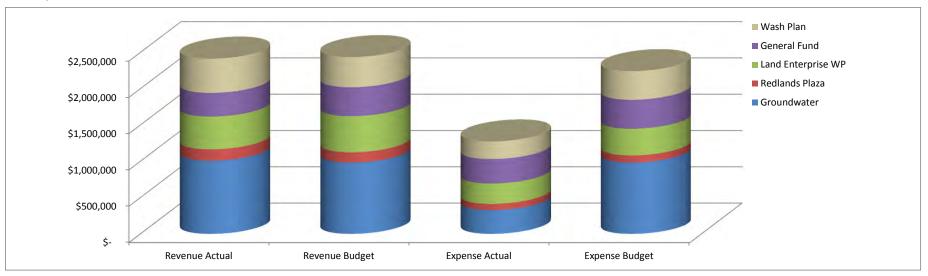

Subject: Drought Impacts on California and Bunker Hill Basin

RECOMMENDATION

Board members should be aware of impacts of drought and consider developing information and facilitating dialog on optimizing basin management.

BACKGROUND

At the March 12th Board Meeting, Director Raley requested a discussion of the status of the Basin and recommended review of the Western Water edition on overdraft. A copy of the Western Water edition and other articles on water management are at Board places. Staff will provide a short introduction into the status of the Paso Robles Area in comparison to the Bunker Hill Basin from the EI and BTAC Reports.

DISCUSSION

In preparation for this item several observations were notes and may wish to be discussed:

- Based on the Engineering Investigation the Board expressed concern over the level of the groundwater basin and the level that could be expected if little rain is received, an additional reduction of between 60,000 and 90,000 AF. It may be valuable to quantify the issues if this occurs.
- Demand on the Groundwater basin is expected to increase as the economy returns to more normal growth and new home building commences.
- Modeling of projected climate variability indicates a possibility that the past years were unseasonably wet, allowing production beyond the supplies that may be available in the future.
- In the Strategic Plan process the Board recognized additional Water Conservation (recharge) and Water use efficiency or use reduction is needed
- The Board may wish to discuss ways to optimize basin management increasing recharge and conservation to avoid restrictions and reduce costs
- The Board may wish to assist the basin in a broader discussion of these issues by facilitating dialog on the importance of the drought impacts and the opportunity it provides for future planning.

FISCAL IMPACT

District impacts from discussion would be minimal. Securing water in high demand times is likely cost prohibitive for the District. A well-managed basin provides value to groundwater charge payers.

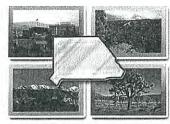

General Manager's Report

For March 6 to April 3, 2014 Daniel B. Cozad



The following report summarizes the efforts and activities during the reporting period.

- 1. Water Conservation Plan Goal 1 Water recharge activities continue to be busy in March. Cleanup of the winter storms was completed and assessment of preventative measures began. Field staff also completed other maintenance activities. Staff is working with DWR and the contractors for EBX 2 construction and completion of dike repairs for Mill Creek basins. Field staff provided coordination for other work and cleanout of basins ongoing in both Mill Creek and in Santa Ana Spreading Basins. Recent storms have not provided significant recharge or damage to facilities.
- **2. Personnel/Administration/Staff** *Plan Goal* 6 Staff estimated the costs for benefits and changes for the budget and in changing regulations and laws for the handbook.
- **3. Finance/Budget/Audit** *Plan Goal* 6 Staff prepared agency wide estimates and forecasts for all District activities and presented the preliminary draft District budget to the Finance and Administration Committee. The preliminary District budget and comments from the committee will be incorporated and presented in a budget workshop on April 23rd. Staff began contracting and other efforts to implement the new auditor, based on the Boards selection in March. Staff worked closely with LAFCO staff on responses and preparation of backup paperwork for the Financial Indicators report.
- **4. Facility Maintenance -** *Plan Goal 1* Sufficient water has not been available to test Dike D restoration which was completed last month. Staff worked with contractors and permitees for their on-site field work and aggregate management by Upland Rock and Munoz Construction. Coordinated with Upland Rock on material processing licenses and received payments for material sales. Staff coordinated with the City of Highland on their use of the access permit for their contractor for the stockpiling of rock from their excavation in the Borrow Pit. This initial work is complete and the rock and soil will be stored and reused in the construction of the road. Staff began planning maintenance and changes for the Canyon Shop for storage changes.
- **5. Mining** *Plan Goal 2/3* District Counsel and CEMEX are preparing efforts for setting the royalty market Rate under the Agreement. District staff and CEMEX Management also reviewed mining operations plan layout and met with flood control for work under the easement.
- **6.** Wash Plan Plan Goal 2 Staff held a technical meeting with Task Force members in March and with several members to finalize all covered actions and impacts. Staff is working to get all the signatures for the MOU addendum for the Wash Plan. The next Wash Plan Task Force meeting will be when the draft reports are ready for presentation or policy issues need to be discussed. For more detail please see the written Wash Plan update report.

7. East Branch Extension – Plan Goal 7 – Staff continues to work closely with DWR, contractors and SBVMWD on field activities, coordinating maintenance, management of

flows, facilities. Mill Creek Spreading Grounds excavation and pipe construction is mostly completed above Garnet. flows into the new basins illustrated voids in the basin dike wall that required DWR and contractor to repair. Testing will continue when water is available. Work will restart below (west) of Garnett. Storm Flows facilities damaged our also caused water to flow as far as the pipe excavation. Spiniello submitted a claim with the District tendered to ACWA-JPIA.



- 8. Collaborative Enhanced Recharge Project Plan Goal 7 Significant coordination and cooperation on permitting and environmental habitat issues now related to the Wash Plan continues. MOU with BLM for construction of enhanced recharge operations is undergoing final changes for signature with BLM. Staff coordinated a review of plans for the culvert with the City of Highland for the Greenspot Road/Bridge culvert replacement and upsizing. City of Highland will ensure the facilities initially designed for the District are built; staff appreciates the help of the City. District facilities in California jurisdictional waters will be reviewed with California Department of Fish and Wildlife.
- **9. Big Bear Watermaster** Watermaster Committee approved and finalized the Watermaster Report and the final report was signed and submitted to the court in March.
- **10. Property/Redlands Plaza** *Plan Goal 3* One final new tenant and lease agreement with a Chiropractor to lease Unit I for three years. Staff is getting cost estimates for carpet and paint, and tenant will take possession on April 15th. Coordinating and planning landscaping update for Redlands Plaza in coordination with City of Redlands Municipal Utilities for drought tolerant landscape. Worked with the sign consultant to complete the materials for permit approval of the new sign for Redlands Plaza.
- **11. Public Outreach and Legislative** *Plan Goal 4* Coordinated meetings with partners related to Wash Plan, Enhanced Recharge, water management, drought, and groundwater issues. Staff met with LAFCO related to the Fiscal Indicators process. Staff participated in meetings with SAWPA, SB County Flood, cities, developers and others throughout the region.
- **12.** Current Board Action Implementation Plan Goal 3 Staff is implementing the priorities and prepared project plans for trails and stormwater capture. Staff met with SB County and SBC Flood control agencies to discuss the options for additional recharge in

Mill Creek. Staff also met with the County Transportation staff for the Garnet Bridge. Staff participated in the coordinated drought messages and communications program. Coordinated a tour of Wash Plan and District facilities

- **13.** Computer and IS Plan Goal 6 Staff planning to update the oldest office computers and GIS computer. Completed telephone and internet changes with Verizon, saving costs, billing and other changes are still in process.

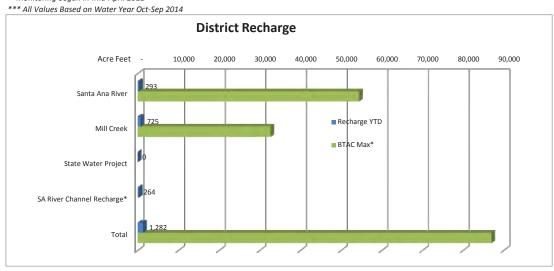

Wash Plan Update

March 6, 2014 through April 4, 2014



Staff working with Fish and Wildlife Service, developed a comprehensive geodatabase that summarizes all covered activities including operations and maintenance schedules. This database also summarizes the implementation schedule of construction projects, including additional water conservation facilities. This month staff and consultants have been working to add the conservation lands and management areas to the geodatabase. Last month, staff met with each of the project proponents to finalize covered activities and to answer questions concerning the next steps in the process. Several additional projects, including two water treatment facilities, were identified and updated in the database.

Staff and consultants continue to work on preliminary impacts analysis based on a simple multi-level description of impacts. Each covered activity will have no impact, low impact, or high impact on each of the species considered. These impacts will be calculated for both construction and operation of facilities. Total cost of specific mitigation can then be assigned proportionate to impact. Additionally, staff is recommending a category for "trace" habitat values. It is likely that some of the water recharge facilities provide some habitat benefits when not in use, especially for San Bernardino kangaroo rat.

Staff has scheduled a workshop with FWS staff to merge the mitigation database with the covered activities database and establish update protocols so agency staff and consultants are all using the same information. Additionally, data errors and overlapping land uses must be corrected. Staff is also working with FWS to identify participants for a workshop on slender horned spine flower biology and ecology. Of the species covered in the wash plan, the least is known about the spine flower. A successful HCP depends on the ability to significantly increase the reproduction of spine flower on the HCP site. A number of techniques will need to be developed for a habitat management plan, so the species can be adaptively managed.

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U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein Remarks at the Association of California Water Agencies Annual Conference February 26, 2014

It has been a few years since I last addressed this group to talk about water. Since then, we have found ourselves in one of the most challenging and contentious periods in California water history.

With that in mind, I want to talk about short- and long-term solutions. I will focus on three things:

- My actions in response to the drought;
- The issue of increased water storage; and
- The upcoming state water bond.

Drought Response

It has been more than a month since Governor Brown declared a drought emergency, and three years since all Central Valley Project contractors received more than 50 percent of their contract water allocations. We may be in a state of continuing drought.

The statistics are troubling. According to the Department of Water Resources, Shasta, Oroville, and San Luis reservoirs are all below 40 percent of capacity today. Statewide, the snow water equivalent is only 22 percent of normal.

The State Water Project, for the first time in its history, is providing a zero initial allocation to water contractors.

Last week, Reclamation also announced a zero initial allocation for agricultural water service and Friant Division contractors, and significant cutbacks – down to 40 percent – for senior water rights holders like the Settlement and Exchange Contractors.

I am troubled that there are at least 10 communities at risk of running out of water within two months. More will face the same situation if there is no relief.

We hoped for some reprieve a few weeks ago when Northern California saw its first major storm in more than a year.

Unfortunately, as the National Weather Service put it: we had a five-gallon bucket to fill, but got only about a 10-ounce coffee cup's worth of water.

My worry is not just about farmers, but the entire economy of our State. Businesses, fishermen, factories, schools, hospitals, fire departments, social and government services – everyone is affected.

We need a forceful and immediate response. That is why I introduced the Emergency Drought Relief Act of 2014 along with Senators Boxer, Wyden and Merkley, and Congressman Costa in the House.

This bill focuses on increasing water supplies in California beginning this year.

It would cut red tape and free up federal agencies to operate with maximum flexibility and speed so they can move water to those who need it.

When there is more rain, this bill will make an even greater difference.

Let me sum up how this bill would help. I will begin with five measures that call for smarter ways to manage and increase our water supplies.

Five mandates

First, our bill directs federal agencies to open water gates on the Sacramento River for as long as possible when few salmon are migrating. This should allow thousands of acre feet of water to be pumped without harming the species.

Second, it directs agencies to find ways to control water operations for turbid waters. The endangered Delta smelt is attracted to turbidity. Metropolitan Water District funded studies and models to help determine where the turbid waters are. If the turbidity is not near the pumps, you can pump more water; if the turbidity is near, you turn off the pumps so you don't entrain Delta smelt.

Third, the bill mandates that when the Federal agencies make pumping decisions, they must maximize water pumping to increase water supplies as long as they are consistent with the Endangered Species Act and the 2008 Delta smelt biological opinion.

Fourth, the bill requires that from April 1 through May 31, water pumps must be allowed to operate at the highest level for water transfers – a 1-to-1 ratio in technical terms – as long as salmon still have enough water.

Fifth, our bill requires the federal agencies to issue all necessary permits within 30 days of receiving an application for building temporary barriers and operable gates.

These structures help reduce fish mortality, improve water quality and help avoid water pumping restrictions.

The bill would also reduce bureaucracy by directing federal agencies to complete environmental reviews under shortened timeframes. This is not controversial because it relies on emergency authorities that already exist.

Emergency funding

The bill provides emergency funding and disaster assistance. This includes \$100 million for Interior to provide assistance to drought-stricken states and counties in the West and \$200 million for projects, grants and other assistance for agricultural producers, at-risk communities, private forest landowners, and farm workers.

An amendment to the Stafford Act will also make it easier for drought states to access federal disaster assistance.

Let me be clear: the success of some of these measures will depend on how much rain we get and how much water is available to be moved.

There is no substitute for rain, but it will give us tools to make water available if we get more rain, and to maximize every drop of water in the system.

This bill will benefit many California water users. To make sure this bill becomes law, I need you to speak up in support of this bill, and urge both Democrats and Republicans in Congress to vote for it.

Having discussed the short-term, let me now turn to a crucial long-term solution - storage.

Storage

Southern California is better situated right now thanks to decades of work to improve storage and water conservation.

Metropolitan Water District, I understand, has enough water for 19 million customers through voluntary water use reductions.

Were it not for the more than 2 million acre-feet of water reserves, including 600,000 acre feet in Diamond Valley Lake, Southern California would be facing up to 50 percent mandatory water use restrictions.

The lesson is clear: we must build more storage to prepare for the next drought which is sure to come.

In fact, Reclamation stated recently that without further investment in water management and infrastructure, annual statewide shortages could increase to 5 million acre-feet by 2030.

I have pressed Reclamation for a decade to finish the CALFED storage feasibility studies. In 2014, we passed legislation that would allow Reclamation to partner with non-federal entities to accelerate these studies.

With climate change, I am convinced that water scarcity will become the new normal. That is why California should follow Metropolitan's example, building storage now to capture water from the wet years for use in the dry years.

There are a few projects that could benefit California if some challenges are overcome. I will talk briefly about each one:

Shasta Dam Raise

There is a proposal to raise Shasta dam by eighteen and a half feet. The draft feasibility study for Shasta was completed in early 2012; the final study is due in January 2015.

Reclamation estimates that the \$1.1 billion project could provide a dry-year yield of 76,400 to 133,000 acre feet of water.

In addition, there could be as much as 378,000 acre feet of cold water pool supplies to help increase salmon production by 1.2 million fish downstream of Shasta, and an increase of up to 138 gigawatt-hours per year in hydropower generation.

The draft study estimated economic benefits for the dam raise between \$65.4 million and \$92 million annually.

Now, the dam raise would require occasionally inundating a portion of the McCloud River and its shoreline. The river, as you may know, is protected under state law, and so state law has to change before bond funding can be used to raise Shasta.

Sites Reservoir

Unlike Shasta, Sites would be a new reservoir.

Reclamation estimates that this proposed 1.8 million acre-feet facility could yield 530,000 to 640,000 acre feet of water. The current cost estimate is unclear, but a previous estimate was between \$3.3 and \$3.9 billion.

Sites' project aims to provide north-of-Delta storage to improve water supply reliability for municipal, industrial, agricultural, and environmental uses. There could also be benefits for hydropower generation and Delta water quality.

What we need to keep the study moving forward is for the State to provide its share of funding.

Temperance Flat

Storage south of the Delta is also necessary, which brings me to Temperance Flat.

This proposal is for a new dam and reservoir on the upper San Joaquin River, about 25 miles northeast of Fresno. The facility would be 665 feet high, with a capacity of 1.33 million acre-feet.

The project is intended to provide additional supply reliability for Central Valley agriculture and State Water Project users, and to enhance river water temperature and flow conditions to support fish.

This project could also help Reclamation capture more water because currently, due to Millerton Lake's limited storage, an average of about 450,000 acre feet of water is lost annually during wet years to runoff instead of being captured.

The draft feasibility was released this month. Project costs, depending on the alternatives, range from \$2.49 to \$2.56 billion. Estimated potential water yield is between 61,000 to 76,000 acre feet.

The estimated monetary benefits for the various alternatives range from \$95 million to \$578 million.

It is my understanding that for the project to be built, several hydropower plants will have to be relocated. I hope we can find a solution.

San Luis Reservoir

Besides the CALFED storage studies, I think one additional proposal ought to be investigated further, and Reclamation agrees.

Reclamation has been trying to find ways to repair the Sisk Dam at San Luis Reservoir because of seismic risks.

Reclamation then realized there is an opportunity to consider increasing storage at San Luis Reservoir while completing the seismic work.

An appraisal study released in December 2013 included an alternative that would raise San Luis Reservoir's water surface by 10 feet and the dam crest by 20 feet. A partial cost estimate says the conceptual alternative will cost at least \$360 million, not including some design and construction costs.

The study also estimated that fully two-thirds of this cost would be for seismic safety improvements to the existing San Luis Reservoir that are required regardless of whether the reservoir is enlarged.

This means that the incremental cost of raising the reservoir could be only \$120 million.

Reclamation estimates this alternative would increase the reservoir's capacity by about 130,000 acre feet, yielding 43,000 acre feet of additional average annual Delta exports. For \$120 million, this would be a lot of bang for the buck.

Furthermore, Reclamation estimates that if the reservoir capacity is increased by 400,000 acre-feet, there could be an additional 71,000 acre feet of Delta exports.

Reclamation concluded that enlarging San Luis Reservoir ought to be studied further.

As you can see, storage is not just for farms and businesses, but could also benefit municipalities, natural habitats, and fish species.

I am going to continue pressing Reclamation to complete these studies, including San Luis Reservoir. But getting the studies done is just the first step. We need to be prepared financially to see them to completion, which brings me to my last topic today.

The water bond

I know there are many views about the size and scope of a water bond to solve our water challenges.

There have been dueling proposals in the State Legislature – a \$6.5 billion bond by Assemblyman Anthony Rendon, and a \$6.8 billion bond by Senator Lois Wolk.

I am concerned that neither proposal will provide enough funding for storage projects like the ones I have discussed. In fact, I understand that Senator Wolk's bill would prohibit funding for Shasta.

In my view, the bond should be under \$10 billion, but should include at least \$3 billion for storage, and about \$3 billion for the Delta.

I know there are some other proposals that approach this level of funding. For example, Assemblymen Perea, Gray and Salas and Senator Cannella introduced A.B. 2686 last Friday, a \$9.25 billion bond that includes \$3 billion for storage and \$2.25 billion for the Delta.

To keep the size of the bond manageable, it should not include local projects unless they can provide significant water supply and water quality benefits.

The 18-foot Shasta raise has a benefit-cost ratio of 1.21 to 1.71 in the draft feasibility report. If Shasta continues to be one of the best options, the legislature should modify state law which currently prohibits the state from participating in the project for bond funds to be used.

We are in very challenging times, but I am confident that if everyone comes together, as you are doing now, we can solve these problems. I look forward to continuing to work with all of you, and I thank you again for having me today.

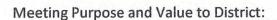
